New and updated reporting requirements under the *Health Protection and Promotion Act*

Dear Health Care Provider,

As you may be aware, changes were made to the *Health Protection and Promotion Act* (HPPA) and its regulations for reportable events following immunization (or adverse events following immunizations (AEFIs)) and reporting Diseases of Public Health Significance, formerly known as the Ontario Reportable Disease List. The updated HPPA and its regulations, including Regulation 569 and Regulation 135/18 (Designation of Diseases) are available at: https://www.ontario.ca/laws/statute/90h07. Changes were made in order to modernize and update requirements to better reflect current evidence and practice for public health programs and services.

What this means for you:

There are changes for health care providers related to the reporting of AEFIs and Diseases of Public Health Significance. Some of the changes came into effect January 1, 2018 and some will be in effect as of May 1, 2018.

These changes reinforce the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care's commitment to *Immunization 2020*, and also support the government's *Patients First: Action Plan for Health Care* by providing Ontarians the information they need to make informed decisions and enabling a sustainable health care system.

In addition, in order to streamline and provide clarity on disease designation (reportable, communicable, virulent), a single regulation assigning all disease designations was created in the Designation of Diseases Regulation. It includes a list of Diseases of Public Health Significance that has been updated to reflect current public health priorities.

The ministry is working with your local public health unit who will assist you in meeting these new requirements.
